Syllabus

Course Description:

This is an introductory course designed to provide basic understanding on management issues relating to nonprofit organizations, which are the fastest growing part of the public sector. The course is intended for students who would like to explore career opportunities in the nonprofit sector and for those who have a long-term goal to develop a new nonprofit organization. The purpose of this course is to provide the student with a good understanding on the fundamental aspects of managing a nonprofit organization. The course will cover five broad areas: an overview of the nonprofit sector; the mission of nonprofit organizations in a mixed economy; the range of organizational forms taken by nonprofits; resource development; and the principle management functions.

The course will focus on developing a working knowledge on organizational structure and management, role of boards, strategic planning, financial management, leadership and networking, public relations and marketing, human resources, fund raising, volunteer management, and grant writing. Particular emphasis will be placed on strategies to reach-out to the communities.

The course will utilize lectures, class discussions and guest speakers with emphasis on student participation.

Course requirement:

Students are required to complete two assignments. The first assignment will be an oral presentation in the class on Thursday, June 16 and Tuesday, June 21. This 15 minutes presentation can either be (1) a critique on one or more aspects of the management of a nonprofit organization in the state of Hawaii or (2) a presentation on a management issue (past or present) faced by an existing nonprofit organization and how that issue relates to the topics covered in the course.

The second (written) assignment will be a development plan paper (12 – 15 pages). This paper will be an actual plan (similar to a business plan) to develop a nonprofit

organization. This paper will be due on the last session (June 30) of the course. Class attendance and participation will count for 10% of your final grade. Class presentation will account for 30% of the grade and the final development plan paper will be worth 60% of your grade.
